We will start collecting for the boutique earlier. February's Trips & Tours

South Bay Nursery Crawl

On February 25, a small and nimble group of intrepid Daytrippers enjoyed the beautiful weather to visit three nurseries in the South Bay Area of Los Angeles. We started at the furthest north destination of Flora Grubb Gardens in Marina del Rey where we met Flora herself who had just flown down, escaping the rain in San Francisco to greet the sunshine of LA.



Flora Grubb Gardens displayed drifts of beautiful, large specimen plants, including aloes, agaves, more varieties than usual of proteas interspersed with large sculptural stone tables and stools, with a soft gray gravel underfoot. This unique collection of drought-tolerant plants offered a soothing color palate of grays and greens with containers providing the contrasting pops of vivid color.

After a lunch of vegan bowls at a tiny spot called lil' Vegerie, we shopped a completely different experience at Deep Roots Garden Center in Torrance. Here was a large indoor nursery of glossy green houseplants, running the full gamut in size from the very tall to petite, from upright to trailing plus pristine succulents, container options and a well-curated selection of tools.



Rainforest Floral, our final destination, was just down the street from Deep Roots where we replenished our inventory of tillandsias, gaped at the very large and vibrant koi begging to be fed, and counted up the sheer number of turtles basking on the edges of the indoor, pond structures.

We were six garden club members including a new member, our 250th member, **Jenny Pass**. Welcome Jenny! And being a small group, we were on a girlfriend outing, and we had so much fun: the back of Polly's car, her "beast" the Escalade, was packed to the gills with purchases!

Gardening 101 For March 2026

The topic for March will be: "Getting Ready for Warm Season Gardening"

Gardening 101 is returning! For interested members, we will meet immediately after our regular meeting in a nearby indoor room for our presentation which will last for 30-45 minutes including questions. The session will be presented by Master Gardeners, **Ingrid Cebula, Wendy Grande, Nora Koenig, and Melissa Rapp.**



Getting ready for our warmer season gardening in Southern California means taking advantage of the region's wonderful climate. Though some plants are more successful when planted during our winter, as temperatures consistently rise from February through May, it's time to transition to warm season gardening. We move from cool-season plantings to warm-season favorites that thrive in heat. In most coastal and inland valleys of Southern California, warm-season plants can be planted from late February through May once the risk of frost has passed and soil temperatures warm to about 60°F or higher.

Successful warm season gardening begins with preparing your soil and garden beds. We will discuss how to prepare your garden and its soil as well as helping you decide what varieties to choose and whether to use seeds or pre-started plants. What do you need to consider to decide? Which is better? How and when is it best to start seeds? When are they ready to transplant?

Please join us! Correct, complete prepping and decisions for your garden can make a difference in your success during our warmer spring and summer garden times! Whether you're a beginner or a long-time gardener, join us to add to your garden knowledge!

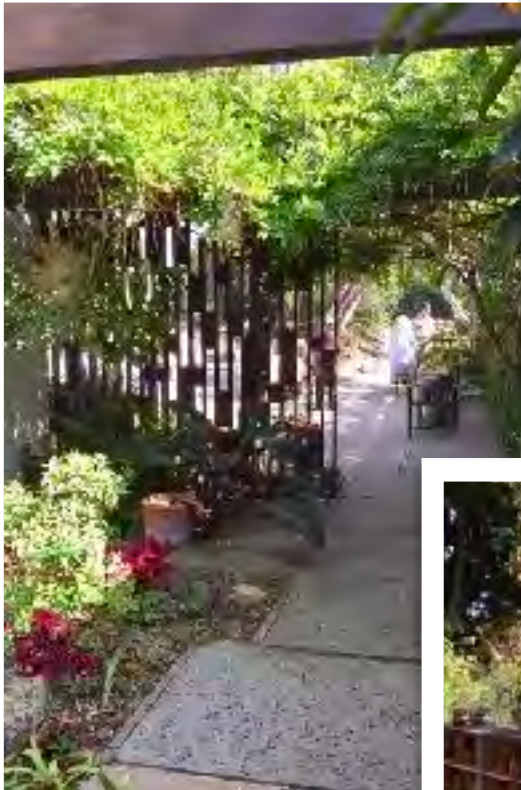

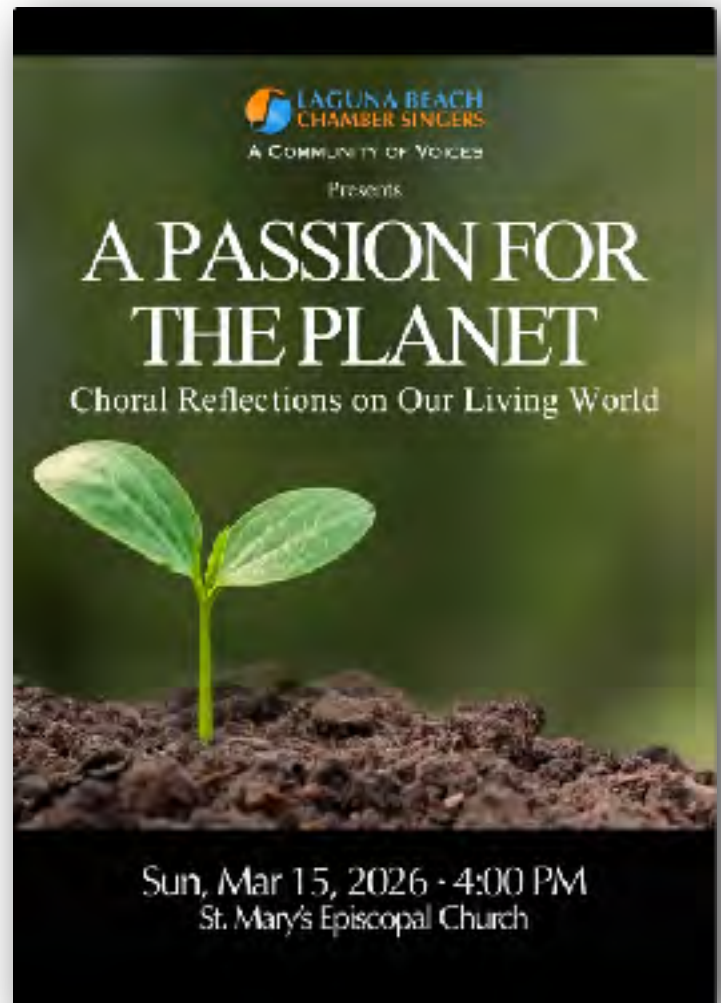
Biography of the concert's guest speaker

4. Photos must be **HIGH-RESOLUTION**. If using iPhone or Android when sending the photo, be sure to send the photo in "ACTUAL SIZE" – not small, medium, or large. Minimum photo size of 4,000 KB is required.
5. To win the **FRONT** cover contest, the photo must be **horizontal**.
6. To win the **BACK** cover contest, the photo must be **vertical**.
7. The entry must be a **recent** photo of some part of the member's garden.
8. By submitting the entry, the member declares that he/she owns the rights to the photo.
9. Entries will be judged by the Board by the end of the club year.
10. The winner's photo will be featured on the front and back cover of the 2026-27 Membership Book.

You are in luck as the Club has several positions open for next year 2026-2027 – just waiting for you to snatch up the opportunity to be of service to our **HIVE**.



1. **Recording Secretary** – Board position. This entails attending monthly board meetings (usually the 4th Monday of the month from late August through May) and acting as an advisor to the Board, the Bylaws Committee, and the Nominating Committee. There is also a Handbook of Board Responsibilities available on our website – or ask any Board member. See Mary Jones for more details. Mary has decided to step aside.

3. **Trips & Tours** – Special Administrator position. Previously for the past several years Patty Gaffney & Synthia Scofield have organized excursions to various nurseries, botanical gardens, and historic spots in Southern California; they have decided to let someone else take over. The number of venues and dates to visit is entirely up to whomever chooses to step up. Patty & Synthia are more than happy to share their experience with you. * **NOTE** –President Nancy Englund has stated several times that if no one volunteers, this enjoyable club experience will **NOT** occur next year.

A VISIT TO THE LAST FABRIC FLOWER FACTORY IN THE U.S.

In January, club members **Jane Leary** and **Kari Nies** visited the **M & S Schmalberg** silk flower factory in New York City. Located on the 7th floor of 242 West 36th Street, M & S Schmalberg has been making gorgeous flowers in the NYC garment district for over 100 years. In fact, it is the last remaining flower factory of its kind in the United States. Owner **Adam Brand** is a fourth generation flower craftsman whose great-great uncles Morris and Sam Schmalberg founded the company in 1916.

Adam greeted us as we entered the showroom. He was extremely friendly and much to our surprise he offered to give us an impromptu tour of the factory where they are still using the original dies and molds and other vintage tools from the early 20th century. Adam explained how they first soak their fabrics in a natural starch solution then hang it to dry. Multiple layers of fabric are cut using vintage steel dies. Originally the dies were hammered with heavy mallets, but they now use a hydraulic press. The cut petals are then pressed into heated molds to give them their unique shaping. The factory is filled with shelves holding a staggering number of different sized and shaped cutting dies and molds which can be combined to mimic different flower varieties. Artisans then arrange the resulting molded petals into beautiful floral creations by hand.

Their fabric flowers are procured by couture houses and film and stage productions, but anyone can provide them with fabric and they will create a custom flower. Adam told us that many people send them fabrics from sentimental garments to make into flowers. Such a lovely idea! Most of their sales come through their online Etsy store at <https://www.etsy.com/shop/schmalbergflowersnyc/>. What a wonderful resource for your Gate & Garden Tour garden party hat!

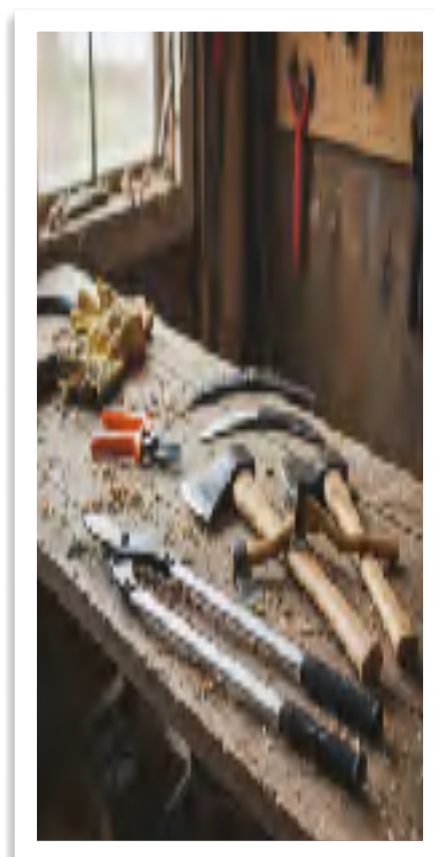


TOOL SHARPENING

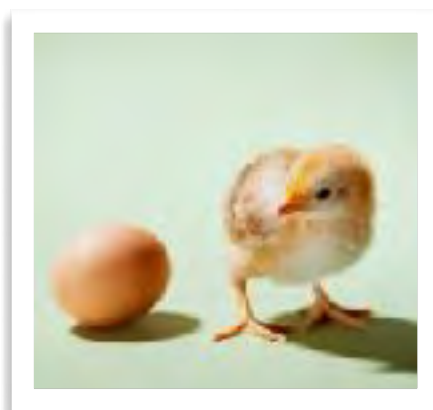
Remember to ask your neighbors to donate their egg cartons. It's fun for me to see a random bag of cartons at my front door and will be fun for you, too.
