President's Message

Planning For A Safe Future In Our Gardens

It is hard to believe that we are already in October. I find that the older I get, the faster time seems to pass by. Be that as it may, we are approaching two things: Southern California planting season and the peak of fire year. We all remember when it was fire season, but no more: it is a year round issue. 2023 will mark 30 years since the massive blaze in Laguna Beach.



So now is the time to start thinking about what to plant that will be low fire risk and need minimal irrigation: remember that we are in a mega drought and climate change is proceeding ever more rapidly. Also we need to increase our biodiversity by planting things that provide food sources and breeding grounds for our birds, butterflies, bees, etc. Last week I visited the pollinator garden that we helped support in Bluebird Park. It has only been there a few months but is

thriving, and I saw numerous different butterflies and birds: an absolute delight!

Our October meeting is all about fire mitigation and what we can do in our own gardens and I strongly urge you to attend. More details are available elsewhere in this newsletter.

To that end, Tree of Life Nursery is holding a Sage

Festival on Saturday, November 14 from 9:00am to 3:30pm. It is co-sponsored by the California Native Plant Society. Every time I go there I learn so much and this should be a wonderful event.

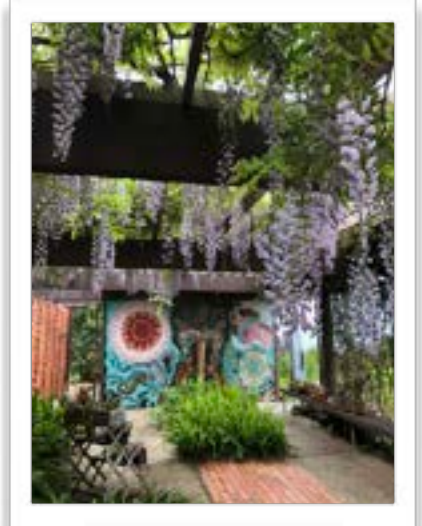

Bluebird Park Pollinator Gardens



Janet Chance, Club President, presented a check to Laura and Michael Ford of the Pollinator Protection Fund on September 22, 2022, at Bluebird Park for their second pollinator garden in Bluebird Park. The park will eventually have three separate pollinator gardens. The first garden is located near the rocket ship. Using funds received from the Club, the Fords cleared and installed plants. A third garden is planned for Bluebird Park in an additional space further back in the park. Additionally, the Club funded the Ford's first pollinator garden in Heisler Park a little more than year ago. The Club is proud to partner with the Pollinator Protection Fund to protect the pollinators in fulfillment of our mission statement, *"a service organization committed to the advancement of gardening, horticulture, ecology, and conservation through education and participation in related community projects."*

The Pollinator Protection Fund is a 501(c)(3) California Public Benefit organization whose mission is to establish, protect, maintain and develop pollinator habitat and breeding grounds in the coastal communities of Southern California. One of their primary objectives is to support the resurrection of the Western Monarch Butterfly population and their habitats in our area by re-establishing and creating new areas to add to their habitat and breeding grounds.

It was a lovely day at Bluebird. While we were looking at the garden & taking photos, the butterflies & hummingbirds were everywhere.

Sawdust Native Habitat Pollinator Project

Your Garden Club is making a difference ecologically by donating funds to ensure that pollinators have habitats to do their thing. Early last Spring the Sawdust Festival dedicated an area in their space to create a habitat for pollinators by using native plants. The Club partnered with five other community organizations to make this a reality. Partners include Laguna Canyon Foundation, Laguna Beach Garden Club, Laguna Canyon Conservancy, Sawdust Festival, CANDO (Canyon Alliance of Neighborhoods Defense Organization), and Laguna Greenbelt, Inc. Non-native plants were removed in April; during the festival months the poster was displayed for all attendees to see. During September through December removal of non-native plants will be completed; January through March next year irrigation and plants will be installed with April to June 2023 to complete final checks. The Native Habitat Pollinator Project will make its debut at next summer's Sawdust Festival.

SmartScape Expo 2022

The Water District has cancelled this year's SmartScape event, that was scheduled for October 15, 2022, which means if you have been harvesting succulent cuttings to donate, you can now either create a succulent wreath or replant them elsewhere. Some cuttings can be donated to the Plant Table at the October 14 meeting.

Below is an excerpt from the email we received from the Water District:

I'm reaching out with some unfortunate news. The Water District has reached the difficult decision to cancel the 2022 SmartScape Expo.

The decision was not an easy one. The Water District has proudly hosted the Expo since 2010 and we are disappointed to have to cancel this year's event. The lingering effects of the pandemic have made it difficult for irrigation and landscape professionals to attend and some vendors are still in the process of recovering. The SmartScape Expo relies on vendor participation to offset costs and to help spread the message of conservation and efficient water use. With the lack of irrigation and landscape vendor participation, the Water District decided it was time to take a step back, re-evaluate the event, and investigate new opportunities to share our message of water use efficiency.
